The SOUNDSMEN were organized in November, 1965, and have become one of the Society's most popular, funny four-somes. Their full-scale comedy style, complete with zany costumes, has endeared them to audiences world-wide. Their unique brand of comedy and rhythm has caught on so fast that they have had bookings in twenty (20) states and Canada, covering eleven (11) districts. Added to this has been a U.S.O. tour, half-way around the world, to the American hospitals in Guam, the Philippines and Japan. All told, they've done more than 160 shows in 15 years, traveled over 115,000 miles and clowned it up for more than 255,000 people.

Their comedy is a mixture of costumes, comic songs and crazy antics, interspersed with rhythm numbers, zipped up with a guitar and a one-string tub bass, (which has to be seen to be believed).

Within the quartet are three past chapter presidents, two past area counsellors, two past district convention chairmen, a chorus director, and an assistant chorus director. If that sounds like too many men for a quartet, it's because those four have worn many hats! All are veterans of over seventeen years service in the Society and all have extensive previous quartet experience.






